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
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President's Corner



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Technical Committee Report

RULE CHANGES FOR 2026

Measurement Certificates

The Technical Committee, and various individual Class members, have been interacting with the ORR and ORC measurement committee regarding the certificates issued to J/105s. In both measurement systems, there is the option for a partially-measured certificate which is supposed to use generic measurements to calculate a boat's rating. These generic measurements are often all the applicable measurements except for the sail measurements. These aeneric measurements are also selected to the end of the known range for each measurement which will yield the fastest rating. So if you go from using a partially-measured (or Club) certificate to a fully measured certificate, your boat is almost guaranteed to rate slower.

We have found that multiple sets of these generic measurements are being used resulting in partially-measured J/105s rating differently. We are working with ORR and ORC to try and get that fixed. One issue that has been a stumbling block is the Class weight certificates that we issue. Many of those certificates are getting very long in the tooth and may be well over a decade old or even two decades old for some boats. This is due to the fact that back when the Class got rid of float line certificates, the Class decided that weight certificates shouldn't expire with age or change of ownership. At that point in time, there weren't any boats older than about 10 years old. That's not the case now. Boats gain weight in the core and/or lose weight depending on the creep of small modifications and whether they are hauled out each winter or not, dry sailed or not, and many other factors.

The Technical Committee believes it is time to institute an expiration date on weight certificates. We believe that a time limit of about five years strikes a good balance between avoiding imposing an undue burden and refreshing the certificate to account for gradual changes in our boats.

However, we don't want to force a giant number of boats with certificates all older than five years to get re-weighed at once so we are looking at a way to phase the requirement in. So stay tuned for more details on that.

In-hauling

Do you read Sailing Scuttlebutt? There was a posting on it the other day talking about inhauling in the J/70 Class. Losing sight of the magic formula The concern there seems to mirror the concern in our Class. Last year, the effort to change this did not go anywhere, perhaps in part to ther being too many options. This will be a point of discussion for this year.

Sprit Seals


Does your sprit seal leak? Does your sprit even have one? There has been an effort led by Josh Lutton and other Chicago area sailors to find replacement sprit seals that are effective. Much like the Class did with the opening portlights, we are looking into purchasing a quantity of these that Class members can purchase as needed. We're still working out the details and pricing, but you should hear more about that in the coming months as well.
